Devotional Reading: Isaiah 42:1-9 **Background Scripture**: Matthew 1:18-25 **Print Passage:** Matthew 1:18-25

Key Verse(s):

"Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:20b-21, NIV)

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Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost. And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins. (Matthew 1:20b-21, KJV)

Questions to Consider:

- 1. What was unique about the conception of Jesus' birth?
- 2. What did the angel reveal to Joseph?

Lesson Aims:
