Nehemiah: The Captive Cupbearer Rebuilds A Nation

LESSON 7—April 18, 2021

Devotional Reading:

Daniel 9:4-6, 15-19

Background Scriptures:

Nehemiah 2:11-20; 13:1-22

Print Passages:

Nehemiah 2:11-20

Key Verse(s):

Said I unto them, Ye see the distress that we are in, how Jerusalem lieth waste, and the gates thereof are burned with fi re: come, and let us build up the wall of Jerusalem, that we be no more a reproach. (Nehemiah 2:17, KJV)

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I said to them, "You see the trouble we are in: Jerusalem lies in ruins, and its gates have been burned with fire. Come, let us rebuild the wall of Jerusalem, and we will no longer be in disgrace." (Nehemiah 2:17, NIV)

Questions to Consider:

- 1. What did Nehemiah do upon his arrival to Jerusalem?
- 2. What did Nehemiah challenge the people to do?
- 3. How did Nehemiah hand his adversaries?

Lesson Context:

- Nehemiah received word from his brother Hananai, and others who had recently returned from Jerusalem who told him about the deplorable condition of the <u>wall</u> around Jerusalem and the potential dangers the people faced because of it.
- Nehemiah cared about God, God's <u>people</u> and the city of Jerusalem.
- The Lord put in Nehemiah's heart and spirit to go to <u>Jerusalem</u> to help in the rebuilding the walls around the city.
- Nehemiah received permission from King Artaxerxes to travel to Jerusalem to lead the people in rebuilding the wall.

Lesson Aims:

As a result of experiencing this lesson, the participants should be able to do these things:

- Examine why Nehemiah decided to restore the walls of Jerusalem and reform/revive the Sabbath law.
- Appreciate Nehemiah's feelings and behavior in restoring the wall and reforming Jewish worship.
- Identify ways to restore worn parts of the faith community and revive traditions that honor God.

► Lesson Outlines/Key Points:

I. Reviewing the Situation (Nehemiah 2:11-16)

Key Point 1: Upon his arrival to Jerusalem, Nehemiah spent three days quietly "reviewing the situation."

Key Point 2: Nehemiah surveyed the condition of the land to determine the extent of what he faced.

II. Challenging the People (Nehemiah 2:17-18)

Key Point 1: Nehemiah called a meeting with the general population and the leadership.

Key Point 2: Nehemiah shared his <u>vision</u> to rebuild the wall with enthusiasm, challenging and inspiring the Jerusalem leaders to rebuild the wall.

III. Denouncing Opposition (Nehemiah 2:19-20)

Key Point 1: Nehemiah faced opposition to his plan of rebuilding the wall.

Key Point 2: The task was already successful because **God's** hand was in it.

► Lesson Summary:

- If God has revealed a task to you, follow the example of Nehemiah by seeking His will and His direction first.
- Total dependence on God is an essential key to effective leadership and discipleship.
