Devotional Reading:

Lamentations 3:22-33

Background Scriptures:

Lamentations 5

Print Passages:

Lamentations 5:1-22

Key Verse(s):

Turn thou us unto thee, O LORD, and we shall be turned; renew our days as of old. (Lamentations 5:21, KJV)

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Restore us to yourself, LORD, that we may return; renew our days as of old. (Lamentations 5:21, NIV)

Questions to Consider:

- 1. What was the prophet Jeremiah weeping and lamenting over in this week's lesson?
- 2. What were the people of Judah experiencing because of their disobedience and sin?
- 3. What was Jeremiah petitioning God to do?

► Lesson Context:

- For nearly forty years, Jeremiah preached, and **no one** heeded his message.
- The Lord told the prophet that He was going to remove Israel from the land.
- Jerusalem was destroyed by Babylon and her people killed, tortured, or taken captive. The Temple was destroyed.
- Jeremiah <u>wept</u> for the suffering and humiliation of the people and because God had rejected the people for their <u>rebellious</u> ways.

Lesson Aims:

As a result of experiencing this lesson, the participants should be able to do these things:

- Understand why the writer of Lamentations pleaded with God for the restoration of Israel.
- Sense the writer's feelings over the oppression of his nation.
- Pray for and engage in the restoration of broken relationships with God.

Lesson Outlines/Key Points:

Pleading for God's <u>Mercy</u> (Lamentations 5:1-10)

Key Point 1: Jeremiah petitioned God to move with compassion on the people's great sorrow.

Key Point 2: The suffering and horror they were forced to endure were the result of their deliberate disobedience and refusal to abandon their **idolatrous** ways.

II. The Wages of Sin (Lamentations 5:11-18)

Key Point 1: No one in Judah was spared of the consequences and horrors of God's judgment.

Key Point 2: Jeremiah describes the devastating consequences of Judah's <u>sin</u>.

III. Pleading for Divine Restoration (Lamentations 5:19-22)

Key Point 1: Jeremiah closed his <u>prayer</u> with a focus on God's divine character. **Key Point 2:** Jeremiah is making a request asking for God to remember and fulfill His covenant <u>promise</u>.

► Lesson Summary:

- There are consequences to repeated and unconfessed sin. Judah suffered loss and brokenness because of deliberate disobedience.
- However, there is hope and comfort in God's Word despite the current condition we may be facing.
- His Word tells us that if we genuinely confess our sins, then He is faithful and just to forgive them and will cleanse us from unrighteousness (see 1 John 1:9).

Many believers find themselves drifting into sin and becoming complacent and nonchalant.
