Devotional Reading:

1 John 3:23–4:3a; Deuteronomy 18:19-22

Background Scriptures:

1 Kings 22:1-40

Print Passages:

1 Kings 22:15-23, 26-28

Key Verse(s):

Micaiah said, As the LORD liveth, what the LORD saith unto me, that will I speak.
(1 Kings 22:14, KJV)

• • • • •

Micaiah said, "As surely as the LORD lives, I can tell him only what the LORD tells me." (1 Kings 22:14, NIV)

Questions to Consider:

- 1. What did King Ahab ask Micaiah?
- 2. What was Micaiah's message to King Ahab?
- 3. What did Micaiah call upon the people to remember?

► Lesson Context:

- King Ahab preferred to have prophets around him who would tell him what he wanted to hear.
- The prophets' blind loyalty to Ahab aroused Jehoshaphat's suspicions about their genuine ability to give a true word from God.
- Jehoshaphat was not convinced and wanted to know if there was another prophet of the Lord who might be more credible.
- King Ahab is hesitant, but he sent for Micaiah and had him brought before them to give the word from the Lord. Micaiah became God's spokesman for the occasion.
- The king of Israel was warned not to go up against the king of Aram because he would die in the battle.

Lesson Aims:

As a result of experiencing this lesson, the participants should be able to do these things:

- Identify with Micaiah's boldness in declaring the word of the Lord.
- Aspire to be like Micaiah when speaking the word of the Lord.
- Commit to tell those in power what the Lord has said.

Lesson Outlines/Key Points:

"Thus Says the Lord" (1 Kings 22:15-18)

Key Point 1: Ahab was only interested in hearing "prophetic" voices that agreed with him.

Key Point 2: Micaiah delivered the Lord's message to Ahab and it was not favorable for him or Israel.

II. Ignoring the **Truth** (1 Kings 22:19-23)

Key Point 1: God gave Micaiah a **vision** to substantiate his message to Ahab.

Key Point 2: God had permitted Ahab's four hundred prophets to speak with a lying spirit to deceive Ahab and seal his doom.

III. **Truth** Will Prevail (1 Kings 22:26-28)

Key Point 1: Ahab refused to repent.

Key Point 2: Micaiah challenged the people present to take note of his words and remember them.

Lesson Summary:

- This lesson challenges us individually and collectively to commit to being the courageous voice that will always speak the Lord's truth even when it is unpopular.
- It is important for God's leaders and God's people to be willing to stand firm on the truths as revealed through the **teachings** of Jesus Christ. "
