LESSON 5—July 4, 2021

Devotional Reading:

Isaiah 56:1-8

Background Scripture:

Leviticus 13-14; Luke 5:12-16; 17:11-19

Print Passage:

Leviticus 13:45-46; Luke 17:11-19

Key Verse(s):

One of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, and with a loud voice glorified God. (Luke 17:15, KJV)

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One of them, when he saw he was healed, came back, praising God in a loud voice.

(Luke 17:15, NIV)

Questions to Consider:

- 1. What did the Leviticus Law require persons with leprosy to do?
- 2. What did the ten men with leprosy ask of Jesus?
- 3. What did Jesus say to the one man who returned in gratitude after his healing?

Lesson Context:

- The book of Leviticus addresses the Levitical Law regarding the disease of leprosy and the issue of cleanliness as presented in the first outline of our lesson.
- Jesus had concluded His Galilean ministry and was making His way to Jerusalem for the final act of God's plan of redemption at Calvary.
- As Jesus and His disciples were traveling on their way to Jerusalem, they passed through Samaria and Galilee. They came upon a gathering of ten lepers who pleaded to Jesus for mercy.
- Jesus <u>demonstrated</u> to His disciples what it meant to be concerned for the foreigner, the
 outcasts, and those who have been marginalized by society.

Lesson Aims:

As a result of experiencing this lesson, the participants should be able to do these things:

- Explore reasons why only one of ten healed lepers turned back to Jesus in thanksgiving.
- Sense the need in your life for increased expressions of gratitude to God.
- Develop a plan for showing thanksgiving to God and others on a daily basis.

▶ Lesson Outlines/Key Points:

I. A Cry of Unclean Grief (Leviticus 13:45-46)

Key Point 1: During biblical times, anyone with leprosy had to announce that they were **unclean**.

Key Point 2: Those who had the disease of Leprosy shared a common experience of misery that brought them together despite any religious or ethnic differences.

- II. A Cry for Unexplainable Grace (Luke 17:11-14)
 - **Key Point 1:** <u>Ten</u> men with leprosy meet Jesus and ask for mercy.
 - Key Point 2: Jesus showed no hesitation or discomfort regarding the lepers.
- III. A Cry of Uncontrollable Gratitude (Luke 17:15-19)
 - Key Point 1: Jesus showed no hesitation or discomfort regarding the lepers.
 - **Key Point 2:** Jesus guestioned why the other healed lepers did not return to **thank** Him.

Lesson Summary:

- We learned from this week's lesson that God loves His entire human creation and calls us to do the same—love one another.
- This unit dealt with Jesus' teaching about faith. We have seen examples of incredible faith in the midst of hatred, discrimination, and pressure.
- Our future deliverance and breakthrough are connected to our faith.
