#### **KEY VERSE**

Know ye that the LORD he is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. (Psalm 100:3, KJV)

Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture. (Psalm 100:3, NIV)

### **QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER:**

- 1. What is the psalmist encouraging us to do?
- 2. What are we to do when we enter the house of worship?
- 3. What is your attitude toward worship?

#### LESSON BIBLICAL CONTEXT:

- The book of Psalms is a book of comfort during times of struggle and distress.
- The book of Psalms teaches us how to worship and praise God. It reveals the majesty of God as well as being a comfort in distress.
- The Psalms is presented in five books.
- Psalm 100 is a Psalm of worship and Praise.
- Psalm 100 is a declaration of the greatness of God.

## **LESSON AIMS**

As a result of experiencing this lesson, you should be able to do these things:

- Understand why and how God is to be worshipped, as found in Psalm 100.
- Appreciate that God is worthy to be praised.
- Create a psalm of praise for the Lord.

# **LESSON OUTLINES AND KEY POINTS**

- I. Because He Made Us (Psalm 100:1-3)
  - a. Key Point 1: Praise God.
  - b. Key Point 2: The Lord is both God and creator.
- II. Because He "Mercied" Us (Psalm 100:4-5)
  - a. Key Point 1: We are to come into the house of worship with praise and thanksgiving.
  - b. Key Point 2: God extends His mercy to all.

- There are many good reasons to celebrate the Lord and make a joyful noise in His presence.
- Whether at church or in our time of private devotion, we should enter into worship and worship with joy, praise, and thanksgiving.
